services, e.g., utility payments, rental assistance, etc.  Boys & Girls Clubs of Central Orange Coast recently merged with Youth Employment Service (YES) to provide no-cost job readiness programming that prepares low-income Costa Mesa youth ages 16-24 to search, interview for, secure and maintain meaningful employment. Our Workforce Development program promotes economic opportunity in Costa Mesa by ensuring youth who desire pathways beyond a four-year university are given the resources and support needed to earn an above livable wage job. Grant funds will be used to support the salaries of program staff who work directly with youth.							

## 3. Community Need:

According to the 2022 U.S. Census' American Community Survey, 11% of the population for whom poverty status is determined in Costa Mesa live below the poverty line. This is a 2.4% increase from 2021 (8.6%) and a .7% increase from 2020 (10.3%). Individuals within the 16-24 age range compose approximately 16% of the demographic living in poverty, with more than half being from minority populations.

Our work with Costa Mesa youth is critical. They are not simply looking for jobs to gain extra income for themselves; their employment is vital to their family's ability to stay housed and fed. Poverty, unemployment, ethnicity, isolation, personal crises, destitution and homelessness are mutually reinforcing. Our organization seeks to address this community need by helping low-income, at risk youth develop the hard and soft skills needed to succeed in the workforce early on, effectively breaking cycles of poverty and setting youth on an upwards trajectory.

Through Workforce Development, we don't just help youth successfully search, interview for and land meaningful jobs. We help youth cultivate their skills, contribute to the economy and enhance their wellbeing and that of their families.

## 4. Organization Capacity & Experience:

State your organization's experience in carrying out the proposed program including information about the length of time the organization has provided the proposed service(s), partnerships & collaborations with other nonprofits and jurisdictions, staff qualifications and other relevant information.

Our organization partners with Orange County high schools to bring our program to senior classrooms. Our Costa Mesa high school partners include: Early College, Estancia, and Costa Mesa where the Workforce Development program is provided to the senior class as part of their exit project.

Each year, our organization closely collaborates with approximately 200 local employers to place youth in appropriate and meaningful jobs. This includes reaching out to local employers with whom we develop strong relationships and posting their employment opportunities on our job board. In an effort to build relationships with these employers, our organization is a member of local Chambers of Commerce and canvasses the community for businesses that would hire youth in livable-wage, entry level positions.

Organization-wide, we partner with over 55 other nonprofit organizations to offer courses and workshops such as financial literacy, healthy cooking and English as a second language, serving over 350 low-income families daily. We believe that a more united community is a stronger community. We make it a priority to increase our number of community partners to best serve our youth and families and have a proven track record of accomplishing this goal. For the past decade, we have increased our number of community partnerships by approximately 7-10% each year.
