The Home Delivered Meals program provides meals to older adults who are low income, homebound with limited mobility due to illness, disabled, and lack access to transportation. Meals on Wheels OC partners with the Costa Mesa Senior Center to deliver meals to clients living in Costa Mesa. Community volunteers deliver breakfast, lunch, and dinner for 5 days of the week, as funding permits. CDBG funds will go towards the raw food costs to provide meals for Costa Mesa seniors.						

3. Community Need:

Food insecurity is associated with several chronic health issues in older adults. According to the 2023 Orange County Report on Aging, 33% of Orange County older adults whose income is less than 200% of the Federal Poverty Level experience food insecurity. There is a strong correlation between social isolation/loneliness and poor health. For example, seniors who are facing social isolation have an increased risk of developing dementia. The Home Delivered Meals Program aims to meet the nutritional needs of older adults in order to improve their overall health and well-being. The program provides homebound seniors the opportunity to make social connections and remain independent. The Meals on Wheels OC Impact Report presented in 2023, surveyed program participants to determine the program impact. Of those surveyed, 95% agreed that the meals provided the nutrition to be healthy, 95% agreed that the meals help them eat healthier foods, 79% agreed that without the HDM program they would not have enough to eat some days, 83% agreed that their physical health has improved since receiving meals, 93% agreed that their health conditions are easier to manage because of the meals they receive, 94% agreed that they are more independent because of the meals program, 96% agreed that the meals help respondents continue living at home, 98% agreed that they enjoy the company of the drivers delivering the meals, and 99% would recommend the program to others.

4. Organization Capacity & Experience:

Meals on Wheels OC collaborates with many local organizations including: Orange County Strategic Plan on Aging, Orange County Adult Day Services Coalition, and Orange County Aging Services Collaborative (members include: AARP, Age Well Senior Services, AltaMed Health Services, Alzheimer's OC, Alzheimer's Association, CalOptima, Care Giver Resource Center OC, Council on Aging etc). We also work with state and national organizations whose missions align with our goals including National Association of Nutrition and Aging Services Programs, Meals on Wheels America, and California State Associations. MOW OC is the largest food and nutrition food provider for older adults in Orange County and is prepared to continue providing services to participants in Costa Mesa. Our partnership with Costa Mesa spans many years and together we facilitate the Lunch Cafe Meals Program from their Senior Center. MOW OC sponsors 23 Lunch Cafe sites county-wide. We utilize the expertise of professionals and volunteers to offer a myriad of programs and services to older adults. Holly Hagler, the President and CEO has a Master's Degree in Management, Marketing, and Finance. Gio Corzo, the VP of Home & Care Services has a Master's in Healthcare Administration. Alejandro Lupercio, the VP of Social Services has a Master's in Business Administration.
