The Lunch Café Meals Program will positively impact the health of seniors by providing nutritious meals at the Costa Mesa Senior Center. This is a voluntary contribution based program. Poverty is often a predictor of food insecurity. Seniors who live in poverty are especially vulnerable due to physical limitations, health conditions, and isolation. As such our program will (1) alleviate food insecurity and financial stress as no one is denied due to inability to contribute, (2) provide heart healthy and diabetic friendly meals, and (3) continue to foster social bonds.					

3. Community Need:

Food insecurity is associated with several chronic health issues in older adults. According to the 2023 Orange County Report on Aging, 33% of Orange County older adults whose income is less than 200% of the Federal Poverty Level experience food insecurity. There is a strong correlation between social isolation/loneliness and poor health. For example, seniors who are facing social isolation have an increased risk of developing dementia. The Lunch Café Meals Program offered at the Costa Mesa Senior Center aims to meet the nutritional needs of older adults to improve their physical and mental health by offering nutritious meals, opportunities to socialize and participate in community activities, and learn about available community resources. Meals on Wheels OC Impact Report regarding the Lunch Cafe Meals Program from 2023 showed that 95% of participants agreed that the meals provided the nutrition to be healthy, 93% of participants agreed that the meals help maintain a healthy weight, 54% of participants agreed that without this program they would not have enough to eat some days, 87% of participants agreed that their physical health improved since participating in the program, 88% of participants agreed that their health conditions were easier to manage because of the program, 90% of participants agreed that they feel less lonely because of the program, and 97% of participants agreed that they would recommend this program to others.

4. Organization Capacity & Experience:

Meals on Wheels OC collaborates with many local organizations including: Orange County Strategic Plan on Aging, Orange County Adult Day Services Coalition, and Orange County Aging Services Collaborative (members include: AARP, Age Well Senior Services, AltaMed Health Services, Alzheimer's OC, Alzheimer's Association, CalOptima, Care Giver Resource Center OC, Council on Aging etc). We also work with state and national organizations whose missions align with our goals including National Association of Nutrition and Aging Services Programs, Meals on Wheels America, and California State Associations. MOW OC is the largest food and nutrition food provider for older adults in Orange County and is prepared to continue providing services to participants in Costa Mesa. Our partnership with Costa Mesa spans many years and together we facilitate the Lunch Cafe Meals Program from their Senior Center, MOW OC sponsors 23 Lunch Cafe sites county-wide. We utilize the expertise of professionals and volunteers to offer a myriad of programs and services to older adults. Holly Hagler, the President and CEO has a Master's Degree in Management, Marketing, and Finance. Gio Corzo, the VP of Home & Care Services has an Master's in Healthcare Administration. Alejandro Lupercio, the VP of Social Services has a Master's in Business Administration.
