FHF utilizes CDBG funds to accomplish the objectives including: salaries, benefits, rent, communications, mileage, insurance, consultants, staff development, testing, general office supplies, printing, outreach expenses.

FHF's Fair Housing Program meets the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development requirement that CDBG recipients must Affirmatively Further Fair Housing.

This requirement is outlined in the following: Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968; Section 808(e)(5) of the Fair Housing Act; Section. 104(b)(2) of the Housing and Community Development Act of 19741974, as amended, and Section 105(b)(3) of the National Affordable Housing Action of 1990.

FHF's Fair Housing Program meets the National Objective to benefit low and moderate-income persons, area wide, throughout the entire city limits. The program specifically provides for the provision of public and community services for very low and moderate-income persons, those individuals with special needs including the disabled, seniors, veterans, and female headed households. Based on the 2022-2023 Annual Report for the City of Costa Mesa, FHF provided direct client services and 92% were of extremely low to moderate-income.

4. Organization Capacity & Experience:

State your organization's experience in carrying out the proposed program including information about the length of time the organization has provided the proposed service(s), partnerships & collaborations with other nonprofits and jurisdictions, staff qualifications and other relevant information.

FHF has been providing fair housing services in Orange and Los Angeles Counties for 60 years. Currently FHF contracts with 25 Cities although this continues to increase annually due to the quality and level of services provide directly for every City. FHF meets or exceeds all contracted services annually. With an average length of 10 years with FHF, staff includes 8-bilingual in Spanish, 1- Vietnamese, and 1- in American Sign Language (ASL) and FHF maintains a contract with Certified Languages International provides real time interpreting in 230+ additional languages. FHF requires and continues fair housing education for all staff through attendance at annual trainings conducted by the National Fair Housing Alliance, John Marshal School of Law, and by HUD and CRD. Direct Client services are available Monday through Friday, 8:00am to 5:00pm. All materials are printed and provided in English, Spanish, Vietnamese, and Khmer.

If the Agency fails to serve eligible Costa Mesa residents during the term of the contract, or fails to substantially attain projected accomplishments (defined as at least 75% of projected number of persons to be served), Agency may be required to repay all or a portion of funds already disbursed to the Agency by the city and/or forego receipt of additional grant funds. Agency also certifies that it is in compliance with all local zoning/land use regulations and possesses all required licenses and permits to operate/provide program.
