3. Community Need:

Describe the characteristics of the targeted client population that will benefit from the proposed program, including information such as age, income level, target area and other unique characteristics as applicable.

One of the fastest-growing segments of the homeless population is working families with children, the hidden homeless population. Based on the 29th Conditions of Children, over 12% of children in Costa Mesa are living in poverty and over 33% are eligible to receive free and reduced-price lunch. According to the PIT count, there were approximately 208 individuals experiencing homelessness last year in Costa Mesa, which is a 7% increase from the previous year. Low-income residents struggle the most with OC's high cost of living. With families already financially stretched due to increased grocery and fuel costs, rapidly rising rents are a serious concern for many residents. Without additional support, many expect evictions and homelessness to rise. In 2023, we successfully prevented or ended homelessness in Costa Mesa by assisting 23 families (79 individuals) in finding housing, providing 21 families (67 individuals) with prevention services. In addition, Families Forward provided 44 Costa Mesa families with access to our food pantry, 17 families were served through Thanksgiving program, 12 through the Holiday Wish gift program and 10 Costa Mesa families were assisted with Back-to-School supplies. Of those Costa Mesa families served, 64% were headed by a single parent, 46% had a family member who is identified as disabled, and 2% are veterans or military connected. Simultaneously, we successfully prevented or ended homelessness for 724 families across the county.

4. Organization Capacity & Experience:

State your organization's experience in carrying out the proposed program including information about the length of time the organization has provided the proposed service(s), partnerships & collaborations with other nonprofits and jurisdictions, staff qualifications and other relevant information.

Families Forward began acquiring and managing scattered site condos forty years ago, and in 2015 we enhanced our supportive services by creating an Affordable Housing Program. We own and operate two 8-unit, multi-family projects in Costa Mesa. Our Affordable Housing team providing direct services includes Housing Development Director Lauren Hahn (7 years), Affordable Housing Manager Hanna Ibrahim (5 years), and 2 dedicated Supportive Services Coordinators, Jessica Tovar (6 years) and Enrique Hernandez (5 years). Our seasoned Data and Compliance team will provide oversight and compliance to delivery services.

Families Forward gives and receives referrals within a network of county, city, and private agencies, including county and city social services, local unified school districts, Woman, Infants and Children, 2-1-1 Orange County, and the Coordinated Entry System. Additionally, our Family Navigators and fund development team connect with more than 75 organizations, schools, places of worship, and businesses each year through speaking engagements, personal outreach, our website, email marketing, social media, and brochures. Families Forward has bilingual staff members and volunteers who translate and aid in communicating information to clients. Families Forward is also a founding member of the Families Solutions Collaborative.
